## Office of the City Administrator

2023 is shaping up to be a great year and we are working very hard to bring value and enhancement to the community with several

projects and initiatives. While some projects will take longer than others, we are working very hard to make sure we are planning for a bright future for the Highland Heights Community.

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Here are a few updates on some of those projects and initiatives:

#### Greenspace Study

The City has hired TSW Design Group to help lead an exploration study of the open greenspace area located at the city building campus at 176 Johns Hill Road. A small team of city employees, elected officials, and citizens are working with the firm to help foster some realistic ideas of how to enhance this space for the community. With an emphasis on creating space for everyone to enjoy, the group held a kick-off meeting with the design group in March 2023 and will continue to work with them on several idea variations that can be presented to the public later this year for review. During the public feedback portion, the groups will gather data on what options the public prefers for this space and will deliver a report with plans to the City Council in the fall/winter of this year.



#### Signage/Communication

By now most of you have probably seen the new sign at the entrance of town at the US-27 and I-471 intersection. We have received a ton of compliments and we are thrilled with the way it turned out. We are looking to transform the look and feel of our community through little efforts like this that will really make us stand out in the region. Along those lines, we intend to explore how we are communicating



with our citizens and will be looking to update our website and communication features to enhance that experience.

I am looking forward to a great year and will have several more updates in the issues to follow.

### **Police Department**

Please remember to drive safely and obey all traffic laws, especially on city streets, as the children will soon be outside and on summer break. Also, remember to wear your seat belts as the Highland Heights Police Department participates in the "Click it or Ticket" program.

There have been a rash of car break-ins throughout Northern Kentucky. These usually occur over night on unlocked cars. Please remember to lock your cars and take any valuables inside.

As vacation season approaches remember that the police department will check your residence for you while you are out of town. Contact the police clerk to set up your house check.

The police department has a prescription drug drop box for unused or outdated medicine located in the lobby. The drop box allows for safe disposal of prescription drugs and can be accessed Monday through Friday during regular business hours of 8:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m.

You can always keep track of what is going on in the City either through the Highland Heights Police Facebook page, or the City's website and Facebook page.

Please don't hesitate to call the police if you need help or see something suspicious. If it is an emergency, call 911; for non-emergency assistance, please call (859) 292-3622 for the Campbell County Dispatch center. The dispatcher will put you in contact with an officer 24 hours a day. The Highland Heights Police Clerk hours are Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for administrative needs, call (859) 441-8956. If you prefer to communicate with the police department via email don't hesitate to email the Chief at wbirkenhauer@ hhky.com.

## Public Works

Fortunately, the winter of 2022-23 was a mild one. As of March 27th, the Public Works Department has salted and plowed, cleared icy spots, cleaned curb to curb, and brined streets on 12 dates; worked 91 overtime hours; driven 829 miles; and used approximately 99 ton of salt to make our streets drivable. In an average winter, we are out 25 to 30 times, use 350-man hours, and drive 2200 miles making sure your streets are in good condition. Due to the mild winter, there are fewer pothole repairs.

If you notice road problems such as potholes, sign damage, and overgrowth into right-ofway, please fill out the REPORT ROAD PROB-LEMS form at hhky.com in the City Departments heading.

We have planted an additional 12 Armstrong Maple trees along the northeast side of our driveway to the city building. In future years, we should have a beautiful entryway to the City Building.

We have been working on the Mayor Greg Meyers Recreational Field getting it ready for spring. Seasonal maintenance is almost complete, but the field are ready for play.

#### **Community Gardens**

The community garden located at the south end of the City Building property at the bottom of the hill, is now located on Hilltop Drive, across from Campbell Media. This will be much easier to access and carry garden supplies to and from your garden. #### <u>City Parks</u>

Our city parks will be open and ready for use on April 1, 2023. We maintain our parks and playgrounds throughout the summer and fall until we close them on November 1st of each year. Please let us know of any unsafe conditions you see while visiting our parks.

#### **Code Enforcement**

Spring is officially here! With the warming weather, we find ourselves outside more often and our homes and properties will need some attention. Please help keep our city looking good and maintain all your property by keeping grasses cut, landscaping well kept, and all trash/debris disposed of properly. Dumpsters will be provided from May 19th to May 21st at the Public Works Garage and at Veteran's Park to allow residents to dispose of trash and larger items. Also, Campbell County Clean-Up Days will be April 28th & 29th providing residents several locations to dispose of items (information at campbellcountyky.gov or 859-547-1866). ## **CITY CLERK/TREASURER**

Happy Spring Everyone! I've noticed the park and shelter here at the City Building are getting a lot of use. Many residents like to reserve the shelter for events. If you are interested in using the shelter for an event, please give us a call at 859-441-8575 and we'll check availability. Reserved notices are posted on the bulletin board by the playground to make others aware the space is being used. The shelter is reserved for Highland Heights residents only and there is no charge to use the space.

Credit Cards are Coming! Beginning in September, you will be able to pay your tax/waste bill online with a credit card. Additionally, you may pay your tax/waste bill, or any other city bill, at the City Building with a credit card. We will still accept checks and cash (don't send cash through the mail), but we wanted to offer the convenience of using a credit card. There will be a service fee when using a credit card.

The City's website (hhky.com) and Facebook page (City of Highland Heights-City Alerts) are great places to find out what is happening in the city and county. The website calendar lists events that are occurring every month and the Facebook page is updated regularly with events, city council information, city board and commission meetings, and much more. ## **GET INVOLVED IN YOUR CITY**

Have you ever thought that you would like to become part of what makes Highland Heights tick? There are many boards and committees that help make the City run smoothly – and all need citizen involvement. Below is a list of opportunities for you to become more engaged with the City:

#### <u>Recreation Committee – 4 residents needed</u>

The purpose of the Recreation Committee is to set dates for events; advise on recreation programs, and plan the events. The committee strives to strengthen the community through an array of recreational opportunities for all age groups. Some of the annual events have been: an Easter Egg Hunt, a Memorial Day Ceremony, Children's Halloween Party, Veterans Day Ceremony and Senior Breakfast, Christmas Outdoor Lighting Contest, Lunch with Santa, and a City Volleyball League. This committee meets monthly.

#### <u>Tree Committee – 4 residents needed</u>

The Tree Committee provides promotion and leadership in creating public awareness of tree conservation, tree protection, and tree planting issues. They hold an Arbor Day event every year, usually in April, to give away trees, designate honor trees to recognize outstanding citizens of Highland Heights. Highland Heights has been designated as a Tree City by the Arbor Day Foundation and that is thanks to the work of the Tree Committee. This committee meets monthly.

#### Board of Adjustment - 1 resident needed

The Board of Adjustment hears cases from residents or businesses requesting an exception to the zoning ordinance. For example, if a resident wants to build a deck too close to the property line, the board of adjustment would hear the case. The person who wants to build the deck, and all adjoining property owners, would have an opportunity to speak. The board would then decide if the exception to the zoning ordinance should be granted. This board meets on an "as needed" basis.

#### <u>Planning and Zoning Commission –</u> 1 resident needed

The Planning & Zoning Commission is responsible for reviewing land development within the City and ensuring all development is consistent with the Highland Heights Comprehensive Plan. The Commission is also responsible for reviewing and updating the City's sub-division regulations and zoning ordinance. Additionally, the Planning & Zoning Commission is responsible for making zone change recommendations to the City Council. The Commission meets a minimum of six times per year.

**YOU ARE NEEDED IN THE ARENA** Council Member R. Alex Bramel

In 1910, President Theodore Roosevelt gave a speech titled "Citizenship in a Republic", or most notably called "Man in the Arena" speech, to the people of Paris, France. Though it may have been over a century ago, the President's speech still rings true today. I have an excerpt from his speech framed and hanging on the wall in my office. The excerpt begins as such:

"It is not the critic who counts; not the [person] who points out how the strong [person] stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the [person] who is actually in the arena..." At first read, it seems to carry the sense of arrogance or harshness, but when put in the appropriate context, it is a call to action.

Take a minute to think about the last time that you, a citizen of Highland Heights, attended or watched a City Council meeting, participated in a city function as an attendee or volunteer, or thought about volunteering for one of the many different city boards or commissions. If you are like me, before I de-



cided to run for City Council, I could count all these instances on one hand. Now, think of our city government (and all that that entails) as the "arena". If you re-read the excerpt from the President's speech, keeping in mind what we just spoke about, I would venture to say you have a different perception than when you read it for the first time.

Is it fair for me to ask that you join me in the arena? I think so. How can I and the other elected officials do the people's work if we don't hear your ideas, concerns, and (what most elected officials like to avoid) complaints? Right now, our arena is mostly empty, with a small number of very dedicated citizens holding the line, being the "doer[s] of deeds" for our city. The credit belongs to them.

Each of us has a responsibility to our city to be involved by volunteering for a board or commission or attending city council meetings to hear the city's business and to voice our ideas, concerns, or complaints. If we are not in the arena, we can't be a "doer of deeds", but rather a critic where credit doesn't belong.

Consider coming to your city council's meetings on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of each month at 7pm at the City Building.

**YOUR** voice needs to be heard! **YOU** are needed in the arena!
