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In the last year we used some of the ARPA money by investing \$120,000 in the Central Campbell Fire District, constructed a new entrance sign at the US-27 and Sunset intersection, funded a full-time social worker position within the police department, and are currently putting together a study of the 4-acre greenspace at the city building location.

As I mentioned before, the businesses of Highland Heights continue to invest in their futures. Thermo Fischer Scientific will be doing a \$30,000,000 expansion to their facility and Prysmian Group North America just finished a \$7,000,000 renovation of their facility on Tesseneer Drive.

Looking ahead to this year, we hope to start the design work to realign Sunset Drive at US-27 and look for other sidewalk and road improvements the city can make. We will finish up the greenspace study and look to budget some money into improving the amenities at the city building site for the community to enjoy.

Police Department

Please remember to drive safely and obey all traffic laws, especially on the City streets as the children are out of school on summer break and outside. Also, remember to wear your seat belts as the Highland Heights Police Department participates in the "Click it or Ticket" program. Remember to lock your homes as well as your cars and take any valuables inside.

Remember the police department will check your residence for you while you are on vacation out of town. Contact the police clerk to set up your house check.

There is a prescription drug drop box for unused or outdated medicine located at the police department. The drop box allows for safe disposal of prescription drugs and can be accessed Monday through Friday during regular business hours of 8:00-4:00.

The police department has had two recent promotions; Nick Love was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel (assistant chief). John Dunn was promoted to Lieutenant. Both promotions went into effect July 1, 2023. Congratulations to both officers.

Please don't hesitate to call the police if you need help or see something suspicious. This includes any parking or traffic complaint; it is best to call while the problem is occurring and not to wait. If it is an emergency call 911, and for non-emergency assistance please call (859) 292-3622 for the Campbell County Dispatch center. The dispatcher will put you in contact with an officer 24 hours a day.

Central Campbell Fire District

What happens if you need to call 911 for a fire, car accident, or medical emergency? Who comes and where are they coming from? That is something most people are not able to answer, all they know is if you call 911, somebody is going to show up to help. Let's take a brief minute to explain who the Central Campbell Fire Department is and what we offer.

The Central Campbell Fire District was formed by the merger of the Cold Spring/Crestview and Highland Heights Fire Departments in 2000. We are 1 of 10 fire departments that provide emergency services in Campbell County. Today the department has grown in size, service, and emergencies. We operate out of 1 station, our headquarters located at 4113 Alexandria Pike, Cold Spring. We serve the citizens of Cold Spring, Northern Kentucky University, Highland Heights, and unincorporated areas of Campbell County. We operate with 7 full-time Firefighter/EMT's and Para-

What other services does Central Campbell offer? We offer public education to teach about fire and life safety, station tours for groups or individuals, fire extinguisher training for our district businesses, schools, and churches, emergency plan reviews, and first aid/CPR training for the average citizen or healthcare provider. We offer first aid/CPR training at our fire station on the 2nd Saturday of every even month (i.e. February, April, June, etc.). The class usually starts at 9am and lasts for 3 – 4 hours. Water Safety

Summer time brings fun in the sun and the water, especially for children of all ages. According to lnjury Facts® and the National Safety Council, an average of 10 people die from drowning every day in the United States. It is the leading cause of death in children ages 1 – 4 and the second leading cause for ages 5 - 14.

Accidents happen but they can also be prevented so please follow these steps to keep your loved ones safe and enjoying the rest of the summer:

- · Never swim alone
- Teach your children how to swim and float or get them swim lessons
- <u>NEVER!!!</u> take your eyes off of your child and know the signs of a struggling swimmer
- Do not push or jump on others or dive in shallow or unfamiliar areas of the water
- Ensure your pool has a proper fence/barrier, a latching gate, and child proof access
- Designate someone to watch the water when children are swimming or near the water

Grilling Safety

If you are one of those people who have been waiting all winter long to enjoy the taste of a flame grilled burger or hot dog and even bought a new apron telling everyone that 'Good Lookin Is Cookin!', then fire that grill up! Before you do though, read these safety tips so your home isn't 1 of the 10,000+ homes to catch fire this year sparked from the grill.

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- · Keep children and pets away from the grill
- Never grill indoors and grill at least 10 feet from the home, deck, or around combustibles
- Keep your grill clean of grease and buildup and empty the trap/tray regularly
- · NEVER!!! leave your grill unattended
- If using charcoal, once the fire is lit, chill out on the lighter fluid
- Lastly, if you use charcoal, let the coals completely cool before removing them and placing them in a metal container for disposal

Clerk/Treasurer - Tax Update

Tax season is upon us. Tax bills will be mailed at the end of September or the first week of October. Here's what you need to know:

- Tax bills will be mailed to the property owner of record at the time of printing. If taxes are paid through an escrow account, the bill will need to be forwarded to the escrow company.
- Taxes are due on or before October 31, 2023. Payments will be considered delinquent on November 1, 2023. All delinquent taxes will be subject to interest at a rate of 12% per year and penalties at a rate of 10% on the taxable amount calculated from November 1, 2023 until paid in full.
- · Taxes may be paid by:
- * going on line to www.hhky.com and clicking on the "View/Pay Taxes" button. Pay online with a debit or credit card. A fee of \$2.50 is assessed for debit card payments and a 2.75% processing fee is assessed for credit card payments. We accept Visa, Master Card, Discover, and American Express.
- * sending a check to the return address on the bill. This sends the payment directly to 5/3 Bank for processing.
- * coming to the City Building, 176 Johns Hill Road, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. to pay by credit/debit card, cash, or check.
- * using the Drop Box located just outside the main doors of the City Building. Please put the tax bill and check (no cash, please) in an envelope to ensure your payment is credited properly.
- Waste bills and code enforcement liens, if applicable, are included on the tax bill.
- The full amount of the tax bill (taxes, waste, and code enforcement liens) is due at the time of payment.

Homestead Exemption: People age 65 or older; who own, maintain, and reside at a property as of January 1, 2023, may apply for the

Homestead exemption at the Campbell County PVA office, 1098 Monmouth Street, Room 329. Once the homestead exemption is applied to the property, it remains until the property is sold.

Disability Exemption: People who are 100% disabled; own, maintain, and reside at the property; and provide proof of disability benefits; may apply for a disability exemption. People must apply for this exemption every year at the Campbell County PVA office.

The current amount for the homestead and disability exemptions is \$46,350. This amount is subtracted from the assessed value of your property. **Only one exemption is permitted per residential unit.**

Code Enforcement Update

Summer is in full swing and here are a few reminders to help keep our city looking great: trash and recycling receptacles cannot be set out for pickup before noon on the day prior and must be removed by midnight on the following day of pickup; yards and properties must be maintained and weeds/grass not to exceed eight (8) inches; and all properties must be kept clear of trash, junk, and other items in non-working condition. If you or a neighbor needs assistance with removal of stuff, there may be programs available to help you get rid of unwanted items. Lastly, if you have tires sitting around that need to be disposed of, the Campbell County Road Department is holding a collection event on August 10th through 12th at 1175 Racetrack Road, Alexandria, Kentucky.
