Note from the Public Works Department:

We have had a busy January with snow events so far. Hopefully the remainder of the winter will give us less snowfall. In case we get more snow this winter, you can help your neighborhoods and the Public Works team by getting as many vehicles off the streets as possible so that we can do a better job of clearing the streets from curb to curb. Parking in a "T" or Cul-De-Sac makes it difficult to get the plows around a cul-de-sac or turned around at a "T". Our Ordinance Number 72.13 "prohibits parking in the area on all streets containing a "T" or cul-de-sac and both sides of the street for a distance of fifteen (15) feet approaching or coming from said area and is designated a "No Parking Area".

If there is a fire hydrant in or near your yard it is helpful for you to remove snow from around them in case there is an emergency and the fire department needs to utilize it.

As we start the thaw of winter, potholes will start appearing. If you see any in your neighborhood, please contact the city building so that we can patch them before they get worse
























The official groundbreaking ceremony took place in October for the new St. Elizabeth Healthcare Medical Office Building at the NKU Development.

Through Smart911, residents can create a secure "Safety Profile" that will automatically display to emergency call takers immediately upon placing a 9-1-1 call. When a call comes in, a call taker will see a user's Safety Profile as well as a Facility Profile about their current location.

Users can customize their profile and share any information they would like first responders to have in the event of an emergency – things ranging from information medical conditions to blood type to primary language.

Now, fire crews can arrive at the scene of fire knowing how many people live in a residence and the location of bedrooms. EMS teams can have detailed information about a person's allergies or prescriptions they're taking.

Police can have immediate access to a photo of a missing person in seconds rather than minutes or hours.

Additionally, through the technology a 9-1-1 call taker can even send an outbound SMS/text message to mobile phone callers who are unable to communicate verbally.

As mentioned previously, a user's Safety Profile will display anywhere in the country that utilizes the Smart 911 technology.

All information outlined in a Safety Profile is private and secure, and it is seen only when a participating user dials 9-1-1.
