TAX BILLS

The tax bills will be mailed at the end of September. If you do not receive a tax bill by the end of the first week in October, please contact the City Clerk Treasurer's office to request a duplicate bill to be sent. The City tax bills will be mailed to the current owner of the property at the time of printing. If you receive a tax bill for property you have recently sold, please forward the tax bill to the new owner. If your taxes are paid through an escrow company, please forward your tax bill to the company.

All ad valorem taxes assessed by the City shall be due on or before October 31, 2017 of the year they have been assessed and will become delinguent on November 1, 2017. All delinquencies shall be subject to interest at the rate of twelve (12%) per annum and penalties at the rate of ten (10%) percent on said taxable amount and calculated from November 1, 2017 on said tax year until paid in full.

Also your waste bill is included on the 2017 City Tax Bill.

Taxes can be viewed on our website at HHKY. COM Under the headings click on COMMU-NITY then scroll down to TAXES and click.

REMINDER Homestead Exemptions for the 2017 Tax Year is \$36,900.00. If you turn 65 years of age and resided in your home on or prior to January 1, 2017 you qualify for the Homestead Exemption. You will need to stop by the Campbell County PVA office at 1098 Monmouth Street, Room 319, Newport, Kentucky to complete the proper paperwork to have this exemption applied to your property. You may also contact the PVA's office at 859-292-3871.

People in Highland Heights you need to Know –Dr. Shawn Ryan-President of BrightView

Dr.Shawn Ryan of Highland Heights is currently the President of BrightView which has three (soon to be five) Addiction Treatment Centers in Cincinnati. BrightView is an outpatient addiction medicine practice based on clinical best practices and outcome measures. Dr. Ryan trained as an emergency physican at the University of Cincinnati and simultaneously obtained his MBA while in residency. While he was a practicing physician over the last 10 years; Shawn became aware of the issue of heroin/opioid abuse in the region and for the last 5 years has worked to make a difference in this community.

Shawn points out that heroin/opium use/ abuse has been going on for a few thousand years. Ancient Egyptians had opium wars. The problem for mankind is a lot older than people realize-it seems we have always had a chemical affinity

Dr. Ryan quotes a great book which is a well written investigation report of the topic—Dreamland by Sam Quinones that provides important insights into the current opiate epidemic and the negative relationship with our country and our neighbors to the south. (I highly recommend the reading to anyone trying to understand how we got where we are.) Pain killers in the form of opiates have been over prescribed over the last 20 years and that has fed the addiction that leads to the heroin abuse problem

Dr. Ryan states the 5 areas of importance to address effectively to solve this problem: 1.Prevention—DARE program did not work. We need an evidenced based prevention program


2.Law Enforcement-Penalize **drug dealers harshly**, studies show sending more users to jail does not stop drug use

3.Prescribing-Stop over prescribing opioids (especially Percocet)

4.Harm Reduction – Narcan saves lives, needle exchange programs prevents transfers of HIV/Hepatitis,etc.

5.Treatment—That is where clinics like BrightView play a role

BrightView focuses on Medical, Social and Psychological aspect of treatment. Although medication-assisted treatment is an important part of the model at BrightView, pharmacotherapy alone is rarely sufficient treatment for substance use disorders. The combination of appropriate medications, in conjunction with psychological and social support is a path to a meaningful long-term recovery. They treat about 1000 patients a year with a 60-70 percent success rate. Success rate is defined as an improvement in their life. The treatment might get them back to work first, or off the streets and then eventually off the drug. (See their website for more details at www.brightviewhealth.com). Bottom Line—there is hope- more education of the general public and the community is needed and more treatment centers.



Steve Lehman - Public Works Supervisor Steve has been the Public Works Supervisor since 2014. Steve has lived in Highland Heights for almost the last 40 years and has been active in the community for most of that time. He was an active volunteer with the Highland Heights Fire Department for 29 years counting the merger time with Central Campbell County Fires District. Prior to working for the City, Steve was with Radac for 17 years. He and his wife Peggy of 40 years raised their three children in Highland Heights-Eric, Stephanie and Brad. He was a member of the Water and Sewage Board and was very instrumental in selling the water to Campbell County and the Sewage to SDI. The proceeds of that sale are still a benefit to the City as the interest is sometimes used for extraordinary expenses.

In addition to being a former member of the City Board of appeals, Steve was also a City Council Member for 10 years.

Some of the duties of the Public Works Department are to keep the streets repaired, mowing grass and clearing roads in the winter months. In addition they fill potholes and also help with the landscaping of the parks and city property.

Steve also sits on the Parks and Recreation Committee and is responsible for maintaining the 6 City Parks. (The Pavilion and Play set at City Hall, Carmack Park, The Nature Trail, Veterans Park, Tot Lot and the Overlook Park above 275.)

There are two full time employees that help Steve in the Publics Work Department and a part-time person on occasion.

Steve organizes the Cruz In Concert, Veterans Breakfast, Halloween, Santa, Easter Egg Hunt just to name a few with the help of the other members of the staff and committees.

Steve and his team work closely with the Horticulture Department at NKU for plant selection ideas for landscaping as well as trading equipment back and forth.

One of the big accomplishments in the past year was the purchase of a backhoe that has more than paid for itself by allowing Steve and his team to do a lot of the work themselves instead of paying third party contractors. A big win!!!

Public Works Department

It has been a busy and productive spring and summer for Public Works. Besides the normal day to day duties of mowing about 15 acres of city parks and right-of-ways, maintaining streets and completing any repairs needed on city buildings and properties, we have completed several large projects throughout the city. A few of these are: All of the sidewalk panels that did not meet ADA standards in the Knollwood subdivision were removed, replaced and restoration work completed. Portable hand washing stations and surrounds were installed in Veterans Park and at the Nature Trail. The lower half of Forest Avenue and the parking area at Veterans Park were dug out, the base repaired and new asphalt installed by Public Works employees.

All of the trails at the Nature Trail were cleared of fallen limbs and trees, and widened of overgrowth to make it easier for residents

using the trails. There was a drainage issue at Veterans Park that let water stand most of the year from the highway to behind the playground area. All of the honeysuckle and scrub trees behind the fence were cleared and the ditch line was filled so the water would run toward the hill instead of pooling.

In the past few weeks, we have begun replacing the street signage that is faded and has no reflectivity remaining throughout the city. This will be an ongoing project to get the signs up to MUTCD standards.

It won't be long before snow starts falling and we will be clearing streets. Please remember on streets that are snow emergency routes that there is no parking in these posted areas. You can help your neighborhoods and the Public Works team by getting as many vehicles off the streets as possible so that we can do a better job of clearing the streets from curb to curb. If there is a fire hydrant in or near your yard it is helpful for you to remove snow from around them in case there is an emergency and the fire department needs to utilize it.

If any of you see areas around your neighborhood that needs repaired or attention of some type, please contact the City Building so that we can see what needs to be done to correct the issue.

Police Department

The Highland Heights Police Department is made up of 11 full time police officers, one K-9 and a police department clerk. Along with the Chief of police we have an Administrative Lieutenant, Investigative Lieutenant, Patrol Sergeant, Narcotics Detective and 6 patrol officers. The department has experienced officers with specialized training in all areas of Law Enforcement, including general investigations, drug investigations, Crime Scene Processing, major accident reconstruction, SWAT (special weapons and tactics), arson investigations along with general patrol.

The police department will check your residence while you are on vacation; just call the Clerk's office during normal business hours. You can keep track on what is going on in the city either through the Highland Heights Police Facebook page or the City website. There is a prescription drug drop box www.hhky.com

for unused or outdated medicine located at the police department. The drop box allows for safe disposal of the prescription drugs.

Please don't hesitate to call the police if you need help or see something suspicious. If it is an emergency call 911, for non-emergency assistance please call (859) 292-3622 for the Campbell County Dispatch center. The dispatcher will put you in contact with an officer 24 hours a day. The Highland Heights Police Clerk hours are Monday through Friday 8:00 am to 4:00 pm for administrative needs call (859) 441-8956. Meet K9 Tiba!



Tiba is a black Labrador Retriever who will be celebrating her 6th birthday this November. She has been working with her partner, Lt. Amber Conrad, since 2013 in the fine art of illegal drug detection. Her finely tuned nose can easily locate marijuana, heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine. Off the clock, she also excels at the location of barbecue cooking tools.

Tiba is held to a higher standard than some other working dogs in the Commonwealth

of Kentucky. Her certifications are renewed annually through the much more stringent North American Police Work Dog Association. Helping her maintain this razor's edge of expertise is her ongoing training sessions averaging 16 hours each month.

The team of K9 Tiba and Lt. Conrad has conducted nearly 300 live searches together. These include many different types of rooms, cars, tractor trailers, car haulers, aircraft, schools, hospitals and various roadside locations. Tiba has proven she is fearless and absolutely devoted to her task.



Born in the Netherlands in 2011, Tiba's original name was Millie. She was brought to Highland Heights through the generous donations of the Matt Haverkamp Foundation. Millie was renamed Tiba, in honor of Matt Haverkamp's partner K9 Tibo, who had recently passed away.

Recently, K9 Tiba has been tasked with a new job that she was absolutely born for. She has been asked to play with kids! This is in addition to her normal tasks of drug detection. Since Tiba is a black lab who has not been trained in personal protection or suspect apprehension she is much more approachable to the general public. This becomes especially useful when addressing groups about drug awareness. Tiba is not an intimidating presence and often helps gain the audience's attention for the presentation. Along with this, Tiba has also been recently dispatched to scenes of intense emotional trauma where children are

involved. Tiba is brought out to play with the kids and help them focus their attention on something fun and positive while the adults handle the stressful unpleasantries at hand.



K9 Tiba is Lt. Conrad's third canine partner and has proven herself to be excellent public relations ambassador for the department and a truly phenomenal asset to our community. We hope to see many great years together for this amazing team.

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To: Apartment/Condominium Residents From: Central Campbell Fire Re: Gas Grill Regulations

Dear Resident,



This letter in to inform you of the regulation pertaining to gas/electric grills. N.F.P.A 1 2012 Edition reads as follows:

10.11.6.1 For other than one and two family dwellings, no hibachi, grill or other similar devices used for cooking, heating, or any other purpose shall be used or kindled on any balcony, under any overhanging portion, or within 10 feet(3 m) of any structure.

We have been in contact with the State Fire Marshall's office on October 28, 2014 and they are also in agreement with this N.F.P.A. regulation.

We have been asked that the fire department enforce this regulation as written. Within your complex, we ask that grills be removed from any balcony or patio to comply with the NFPA 1 Section 10.11.7.
